
The very first person to reach the status of billionaire was a man who knew how to set goals and follow through. At the age of 23, he had become a millionaire, by the age of 50 a billionaire. Every decision, attitude, and relationship was tailored to create his personal power and wealth. But three years later at the age of 53 he became ill. His entire body became racked with pain and he lost all the hair on his head. In complete agony, the world's only billionaire could buy anything he wanted, but he could only digest milk and crackers. An associate wrote, "He could not sleep, would not smile and nothing in life meant anything to him." His personal, highly skilled physicians predicted he would die within a year. That year passed agonizingly slow. As he approached death he awoke one morning with the vague remembrances of a dream. He could barely recall the dream but knew it had something to do with not being able to take any of his successes with him into the next world. The man who could control the business world suddenly realized he was not in control of his own life. He was left with a choice. He called his attorneys, accountants, and managers and announced that he wanted to channel his assets to hospitals, research, and mission work. On that day John D. Rockefeller established his foundation. This new direction eventually led to the discovery of penicillin, cures for current strains of malaria, tuberculosis and diphtheria. The list of discoveries resulting from his choice is enormous. But perhaps the most amazing part of Rockefeller's story is that the moment he began to give back a portion of all that he had earned, his body's chemistry was altered so significantly that he got better. It looked as if he would die at 53 but he lived to be 98. Rockefeller learned gratitude and gave back from his wealth. Doing so made him whole. It is one thing to be healed it is another to be made whole.



Pastoral Care Updates—Blakeley Winslow



Hello everyone! There's been lots happening with pastoral care at First Presbyterian Littleton over the last several months, and I'm excited to be able to share some details with you. One of our most exciting ongoing ministries is the at-home communion program. Since May, we've been sending out teams on the first Sunday of each month to take the Lord's Supper to those FPCL members who are no longer able to come to church in person as often. Currently we have six teams which are collectively serving seventeen different at-home members! These visits have proved to be a tremendous blessing both for our servers and recipients. In addition to celebrating of communion together, the visits provide an opportunity for prayer, and fellowship—reminding our at-home members that they are still a vital part of our church family! Beyond just the membership at FPC Littleton, I also have the privilege of getting to share communion with members of the Littleton community. On the second and fourth Thursdays of each month, Stephany Crosby and I serve the Lord's Supper to residents at Highline Place, a memory care facility. We've been assisted in this work by some other wonderful volunteers, including Gary Griffith, Cheryl Baughman, Kathy McDaniel, and Doug Lemieux!

A sad, but important aspect of my role in pastoral care involves honoring the memory of those dear church friends who have now passed on into the presence of the Lord. Whether presiding over an inurnment in the Columbarium, or leading a memorial service in the sanctuary, it is my profound privilege to get to recognize the lives of some extraordinary Christian servants. I am always happy to meet with family members to discuss arrangements for a Celebration of Life for any of your loved ones, so please don't hesitate to reach out!



One of my favorite things that I get to do in my role at the church is visit with all of you! Pastoral visits are truly a joy—I learn so much from the conversations I get to have with our church family, as we celebrate together how the Lord is at work, pray with one another, and share the Lord's Supper. I am always happy to check in on someone, either over the phone or in-person, so if you know of an individual who'd like a visit, please let me know!

Our church staff is blessed to have some extra resources on hand to give to

those in need, thanks to the generous tithes of so many of you! Some benevolence items that we have given out over the past few months include King Soopers gift cards, ARC Thrift Store vouchers, RTD bus passes, food bags, granola bars and water, and occasional assistance payments for someone who's struggling to cover their rent/utilities for the month. As a downtown church, we have many individuals who stop by each day to ask for help, and we try to never turn anyone away empty-handed. A big thank you to Elinor Packard who handles so many of these benevolences and always takes time to stop and talk with visitors, and to Scott Chandler for regularly supplying us with the ARC cards!

Speaking of benevolence items, another exciting thing to report is the launching of our Winter Clothing Drive to run throughout the month of November! There's more information about this elsewhere in the First Word, and be on the lookout for announcements in church! Also consider donating some of your unused or gently-used winter clothes this season to help our neighbors in need of some protection against the elements as the colder months come.

Thank you to everyone who stayed after church on October 16 for a lively discussion over pizza of several questions from the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) questionnaire that's been sent out to all church members. The questions that we worked on included:

- 1) Why do people join FPCL and why don't people join FPCL?
- 2) Which parts of our church life are calling cards for FPCL?
 - a. Which parts of our congregation's programs need to be ended or changed?
 - b. What activities (classes, studies, ministries, etc.) should we explore as new opportunities for FPCL?
- 3) What is the role of the Pastor? For example: can you describe the strengths of your ideal Pastor?

We collected lots of great comments and insights from those gathered. Over the next few weeks we'll be collating all the thoughts that were recorded. When the PNC is elected and starts their work, they'll be able to use this information as well as the questionnaire answers that you're returning to help them understand our church and

Your Nominating Committee (call us the “NC”) is already hard at work, having just wrapped up our first meeting after church on October 23. To help kick things off, we wanted to talk about who we are and what we’re going to be doing in coming weeks.

Every year the NC is elected by the congregation for the purpose of recruiting church members to serve as Elders and Deacons. The congregation votes on those candidates at a congregational meeting (some time in December).



A Minute for Stewardship – Do you give by Reason or Revelation?

The letter announcing this year's Stewardship campaign (A "Season of Generosity") should be arriving in mailboxes about the same time that this column goes to print. You'll notice that we've changed things up a little this year. We cut out a lot of the dry text and numbers and instead offered a simple message that hopefully speaks to the importance of your financial gifts to fund the ministry and mission of First Presbyterian.

Upon receiving the letter and affirmation/pledge card, many of us will sit down with a personal budget with information on our expected income and expenses and how much might be left for charitable giving, like a pledge to the church. And we'll figure out how much we think we can offer and mark up the card. For most this is a very logical and prudent approach. It's giving by Reason.

However, in a recent devotional, Pastor Rick Warren makes an argument that while giving by Reason may be "reasonable," it's an approach that actually doesn't require any faith at all on our part. In fact, he argues that if you're not giving in faith, don't give.

Instead, he encourages us to consider giving by Revelation, connecting with God in prayer and letting God reveal to us what he wants us to give in faith. And then doing whatever we are told to do. This is no doubt a radical concept. But as explained, this is a sort of giving that stretches our faith. And by giving in faith, and giving because of great joy, and not guilt, we grow and ultimately become more like Christ. Honestly that sounds pretty amazing.

It might be quite a leap to move from giving by Reason to giving by Revelation. But how about a small step to start? As you consider filling out a card this year, say a small prayer of thanks to God for the gifts he has bestowed. Remember that it's not always about *WHAT* we give back, but it is always about *HOW* we give. Give joyously. That's an attitude of faith and that's what matters.




Afternoon Book Club Information

MEMORIAL GARDEN COLUMBARIUM FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF LITTLETON

Churches have had memorial gardens, cemeteries and columbarium on their grounds throughout history. In 1992 First Presbyterian Church of Littleton began discussing having its own columbarium. As cemetery space became more limited and expensive, and cremation more widely accepted, the time was right to provide a final resting place for members, friends and families of our church. The following year Session

approved the building of a columbarium with the stipulation that all funding be secured before construction began. Norm Kasch, an architect and church member, developed plans for the columbarium and in October 1999 the Columbarium committee presented a proposal to Session. They proposed beginning construction with two thirds of the estimated cost raised; the estimated cost was \$35,000 and \$20,000 had been secured through memorials, gifts and loans. The Session voted to approve construction of our Memorial Garden Columbarium, with the balance of the cost to be raised by the committee. It continues to be supported by the purchase of crypts and contributions. Construction was completed and the Columbarium was dedicated in March 2000.

NEW KEY ACCESS SYSTEM COMING SOON!

Our Safe and Effective Ministry Team has been working hard to find just the right system to replace our old keys with a new and safer system. In an effort to gain better control of our building's security we are in the process of eliminating the use of mechanical (metal) keys and changing to an electronic key system on our main East facing entry door (by the Welcome Center) and the administration office door. All outside doors and the Administrative office will be re-keyed and a key fob will be issued to those needing entrance to the building outside of normal business hours.

If you are a current key holder, in the next few weeks you will receive a letter explaining the new system and letting you know how and when you can get a key fob. Once the new system is up and running smoothly the key you hold will no longer work on any of the outside doors.

The Safe and Effective Ministry Team has carefully and conscientiously worked to choose the best and safest system for us. Now with session's approval we are making the change.



Dollars and Sense – A Word from Finance

A word this month from guest contributors Jennie Staritzky and Dee Getzinger – on a way for 70+ seniors to increase your pledge to First Pres at no additional cost to you – donating TAX-FREE from your Required Minimum Distribution from a conventional IRA. It's easy, and your financial or tax advisor can show you how. Jennie and Dee told us how in Stewardship's column last March. Here's an encore for timely consideration during pledging – in their own words.

Buckets of Money

Wouldn't it be nice if we 70+ seniors didn't have to pay Federal Income Tax on the Required Minimum Distribution we withdraw from our IRA, then give to the church? Well, my accountant told me an easy way to save on taxes: just have my investment company DIRECTLY give money to the church!

Have them write the RMD check from my IRA to First Presbyterian Church of Littleton – that way, the money never passes into my ownership, and it cannot be counted (and TAXED) as income. Why not try it? It's easy! I did it in one short phone call. It even works if you take the standard deduction and do not itemize your charitable gifts.

As those of us over 70 know, the Federal government requires us to withdraw annual amounts, calculated as a percentage of account size, from your IRA, 401(k), or 403(b) accounts. Whether you need the money or not, you must take the money out. Every penny you take out in your RMD will be taxed.

But your RMD from your IRA is your "magic bucket". You can give **some or all** of that bucket to church or another good charity, as long as it is a 501(c)(3) non-profit (which First Pres is). So, if you are over 70 with an IRA, talk to your financial or tax adviser, and join the First Pres Bucket Brigade! ***Sincerely, Jennie Staritzky***

It was not until our great Spring Fling in 2016 that I learned that I could give money to the church and not pay taxes, by using the dollars from my RMD. It was so exciting and made me so happy how much more I would be able to give First Pres and not pay taxes on the money. So now I want to urge any of our members over 70 to call their Financial Planner. When I called mine in 2016, mine wondered why I had not been doing it – but it was because I didn't know about it. He said it needed to be shared more – and finally that is what I want to do! Share about saving money and being able to give more to the church I love so much.

I send mine at the end of each year for my pledge and even add "extra" in case I want to give something special to a specific group or cause.

Matthew 6:21 says, ***"Wherever your treasure is, there the desires of your heart will also be"*** (NLT). I am now so thankful that I can put my money wherever my heart is! ***Blessings, Dee Getzinger***
